## Fishing Trip




Fishing is a popular outdoor activity in Nebraska, and is now also a part of the 4th, 5th, and 6th grade Physical Education Curriculum at Callaway Public School. Over the summer Mr. Rush became a certified fishing

Instructor which allows him to teach the Youth Fishing Program through the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission. The NGPC Youth Fishing Program encompasses a variety of activities that support youth in learning how and where to fish in Nebraska. The program activities are designed to introduce kids to fishing in a safe, ethical, and enjoyable manner. Certified instructors teach fishing basics such as Casting & Fishing Techniques, Equipment & Knot Tying, Fish Identification & Biology, and Fishing Ethics & Regulations. The 4th-6th grade students had the opportunity to go to a local pond and fish. It was an enjoyable experience for all. The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission also provided the supplies to carry over the education into the art room with Mrs. Campbell. The students had the opportunity to create a work of art utilizing

a form of printmaking called Gyotaku. Gyotaku is the ancient form of documenting a catch by painting your fish and rubbing a piece of paper over the painted fish and making a print of it. This is often referred to as "Fish Rubbing". The Youth Fishing Program provides the opportunity for students to learn that fishing is a fun life-time activity and we were excited to bring it to our students in Callaway.
